Chicagoland **Boasts Many** Skiing Areas

Did you waste the recent snow covered week-ends pipe dreaming of skiing on eastern or western

If so, snap out of it. Top-notch ski areas are awaiting you in Wisconsin, Michigan, and Minne-

If you're a beginning "snow-bunny," you can find skiing fun in your back yard. The Fox Valley ski hills at Cary, Ill., and the Wilmot ski area in Wilmot, Wis., are within easy reach.

Perfect for a day's outing, these

two areas are open Saturdays, Sundays, and holidays. Both offer three rope tows, rental of equip-ment, ski instruction, and 200 foot slopes.

Two of southern Wisconsin's best ski resorts are Holiday hill

not the Slinger area.

Holiday hill is two miles north of Lake Geneva. The Slinger area, comprising Fox hill, the Elba lodge slopes, and Little Switzerland, is only two hours from Chiago by two hours from Chicago by train.

In central Wisconsin, Rib mountain and the Snow bowl are two great winter drawing cards.

Rib mountain, highest point in the state, is four miles from Wau-sau. It has eight runs served by

two tandem rope tows.

The famous Snow bowl, often called the "Mississippi Alps," of-fers long runs in rugged hills five miles east of La Crosse on High-

way 33.
About 440 miles from Chicago reigns Mount Telemark, king of the Wisconsin ski areas. Located near Cable, in the northern snow belt, Telemark probably is the most complete ski package in the upper midwest. Its five downhill runs and new one mile "Cork-screw" run are open daily.

There also are two day trips to Iron Mountair for skiing at Pine mountain, on Michigan's upper peninsula. All-expense rates start at \$33.51.

. . . For hardy Chicagoans who want more rugged slopes, Minnesota's north shore area along Lake Su-perior is ideal. At Mount du Lac, Hidden valley, and Sawtooth, you'll find steep slopes and deep powder snow.

Mount du Lac, 10 miles from

Duluth, is the only ski area in the midwest with a ski school teaching the French [Allais] technique. Jack Murphy, former Sun Valley skier, pupil of Emile Superior north shore drive.

Ninety-five miles up the shore and 250 miles from the Twin Gities on U. S. 61, is the Lutsen ski area.

Lutsen's slopes, called Hidden valley, have runs 2,000 feet long and an expert's wooded trail. Rates at the resort start at \$6.50.

Not far from Lutsen is the fabulous Sawtooth mountain ski area at Grand Marais, Minn. reach Lutsen and Grand Marais by train to Duluth and connecting bus service via the scenic Lake
