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## Winter Sports Areas Snowballing

New Resorts, Improvements Pushed to Meet Record Demand

Additional snow machine coverage, new ski and to-boggan runs, expanded housing and dining facilities and enlargement of uphill lift facilities highlight the expansion program for the 1962-63 winter sports season in West Mishigan.

The winter vacation area will offer visitors a record 36 winter sports centers and resorts

The West Michigan Tourist
Association reports that the
new west Michigan ski cen
ters include Chimney Corneron Crystal Lake near Frank
fort, McGuire's Winter Sports
Area at Cadillac, Pleasani
Valley near East Jordan and
Timber Ridge, 15 miles north
west of Kalamyzon

The 14 ski slopes of the new areas will increase West Mich igan's total to approximately 300, ranging up to a mile and a half in length and with max imum vertical drops of up to 500 feet. The area's ski and toboggan runs are served by more than 100 uphill lifts, in cluding double chairs, Poma lifts, Tbars, J-bars and rope tows.

THE EXPANSION effort is to meet the anticipated de mands of some 200,000 skiers State Tourist Council estimates are that these skiers will average three or more ski trips in Michigan during the coming winter season.

This represents a sharp in crease from the 1961 estimate of 180,000 persons who made

Tourist income from the skiers is expected to increase in
like amount. The estimate of
expenditures from the 180,000
skiers last year was \$18 million.
Winter sports enthusiasts are
expected to spend \$20 million
in Michigan this year, not including equipment purchases.

Two of the new areas, Chim ney Corners and McGuire's are established year-around re sorts which have recently add ed ski runs and tows.

Two new motels, both with indoor swimming pools and with a total of nearly 100 units have been built in the Cadillac area. Three of West Michigan's ski resorts have out door, heated pools.

Goshorn Hills, Saugatuck—Addition of a ski run and tow to existing toboggan facilities. Hu.Lu Heights, Hudsonville—Addition of two ski runs to existing toboggan facilities. Brady's Hills, Lakeview—Installation of electric rope tows

Manistee Ski Area, Manistee

— A change of name to the
"Big M" ski area and addition
of two runs. Manistee installed
a new T-bar and snow machine
late last season.

Addition of two new 1,500-foot toboggan runs to increase it total to eight. Echo Valley is one of the very few toboggar centers in the nation with a snow-making machine. Eigh West Michigan ski centers hav snow-making equipment.
