So far, practice on the Waterworks and Hoyt Park hills has been impossible, so Saginaw skiers have enjoyed weekends at several of the popular ski havens in the northern part of Lower Michigan.

Popular among these sport havens is Skyline Ski Club, six miles south of Grayling on US-27. There three large open slopes—one for beginners, one for intermediates and one for advanced Schuss boomers and bashers—plus five sking trails, are offered.

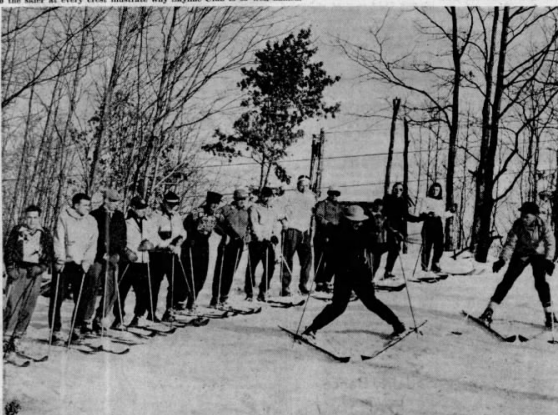
