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Mankato, Red Wing Projects

From the deep south (for Minnesota, that is) comes word of two hardy and hopeful projects to be added to the list of Upper Midwest ski areas.

Bob Wilkins, president of the Mankato Ski club (organized last year and now numbering 65 members), calls attention to Harvey Anderson's Ski Haven, just southwest of Mankato, which offers a vertical drop of 300 feet, two rope tows, a beginners' area and lights for night skiing.

Just completed is a log chalet, "a monument to old fashioned, carved log con-struction"...

Under construction at Red Wing is a three-run ski bowl being built by the Red Wing YMCA with financing guaranteed by a group of local businessmen.

Roy Carpenter, YMCA board president, originated the idea and is handling the construction

New in Wisconsin (to us, at least), is Sunny Acres Ranch at Minong, owned and operated by Roy E. Johnson. In addition to tows, the ranch offers lodging, meals, a practice jump and 640 acres of fine over-

land skiing. . . . The hardy perennials are busy, too, with additions and improvements.

Major among them is the snow-making equipment at Moon Valley near Shako-pee and a similar install-ment at Hardscrable, Rice Lake, Wis.

Minneapolis' Mt. Nor-

mandale now offers 60 acres of lighted slopes and, of course, that platter lift which can still be regarded as new since it got only a one-day workout last sea-

Buck Hill at Savage has a new beginners' hill with an 800-foot separate tow and a new run for intermediate skiers.

Trollhaugen, Dresser, Wis., which was almost washed away by last summer's floods, has had a \$10,000 face lifting which includes new runs and two new electric tows.

Val Chatel at Park Rapids, Minn., has undergone a large-scale expansion through the efforts of the Park Rapids Ski club which subscribed \$5,000 and considerable time and effort to the cause. Major improvements include an addition to the chalet housing a restaurant, and ski shop; regrading of the main runs, doubling their size; doubling the size of the parking lot; and increasing beginners' slope seven times its previous
