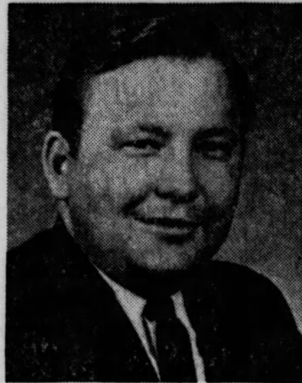


Hide-A-Way Hills Names New Development Manager

The Hide-A-Way Hills board of directors has appointed Cleatis Mullen president and general manager of the resort development, according to board member Stephen J. Gabay. Formerly sales manager of the company, Mullen succeeds J. W. McGough who resigned last month.

A native of Cuba, Mo., Mullen joined the Hide-A-Way Hills sales staff three years ago. He was previously associated with the Olivetti Underwood Corporation in St. Louis, and served in an executive capacity with a resort community in Missouri from 1952 to 1955.

The Hocking Hills development was begun in 1962 with 1,000 half-acre lots planned in addition to four lakes, extensive wooded areas and outdoor recreation facilities. Additional property, since acquired, has increased its size to 1,500 acres and 2,000 half-acre lots.

Last summer marked the completion of a half-million-dollar dam, and the grand opening of the 120 - acre Lake of the

Four Seasons.

Mullen reported that over 800 lots have been sold, and more than 200 permanent and vacation homes have been built in the \$8,000,000 year - round resort.

Present facilities at Hide-A-Way Hills include an 8,000-square foot air - conditioned lodge, five separate lakes for fishing and boating, golf course, Olympic-size swimming pool, one-half-mile illuminated ski slope and trail with ski tow and snow-making equipment, and facilities for 18 other outdoor sports, including tennis, volleyball, archery and horseback riding.

A member of the Columbus Downtown Lions, Mullen resides with his wife Shirley and two sons at Hide-A-Way Hills.
