

Peace In The Valley?

A court showdown involving a Kellyville area snow-making machine was avoided at least temporarily Friday as operators agreed to seek a muffled noise level acceptable to neighbors.

Associate District Judge

Wesley Whittlesey continued the hearing until 2 p.m. Tuesday, at which time arguments may be resumed if a solution has not been reached.

Michael Stout filed Wednesday for an injunction against

operation of the Snow Valley machine between the hours of 8 p.m. and 8 a.m., contending its noise prevented his family from sleeping.

Defendant in the suit is Willis Barrows, doing business as

Snow Valley, Oklahoma's first commercial ski area.

Patricia Sellers, attorney for Stout, said the parties had agreed on a trial operation with a structure built over the snow-maker compressor in an attempt

to baffle the sound.

More than 25 spectators, plus metropolitan newsmen, were present for the scheduled hearing.

Judge Whittlesey Wednesday issued a temporary injunction against operation of the machine during the hours specified, and had set hearing Friday on whether it should remain in effect.

Despite the agreement, Barrows still had the problem of the weather to contend with.

Barrows had hoped for a December opening of the ski area just off Heyburn Dam road southwest of Kellyville. His plans were foiled by a wet, warm month which seldom saw temperatures dip into the 30s.

After a bone-chilling cold front brought a smattering of real-life snow Monday, Barrows scurried to the resort to prepare for skiers.

A broken valve and a replacement for his compressor caused further anguish. There was sufficient snow for a few trial runs, however, and sight-seers continued to flock to the scene.

By noon today the temperature had climbed to 49, and the weatherman's prediction was for sunny skies and readings in the 60s by Saturday.

Iberian Airliner Crashes

IBIZA, Spain (UPI)—An Iberian Airlines Caravalle jet with 104 persons aboard crashed in rainy, murky weather today on a 1,515-foot mountain on this Mediterranean resort island, killing all aboard.

An Iberia spokesman said there were many foreigners among the passengers flying from Valencia to the island, jammed this time of year with thousands of visitors. There was no immediate indication if the dead included Americans.

A police spokesman at the island village of San Antonio Abad said rescuers who reached the wreckage of the plane near the summit of Atayasa Mountain reported there "apparently" were no survivors.
