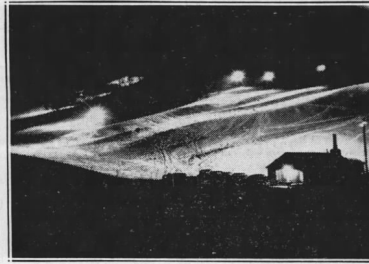
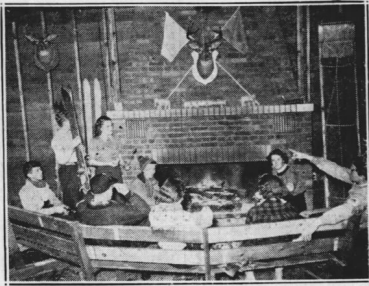


Development Of Snow Bowl Makes City Of La Crosse Ski Center Of Northwest

The Snow Bowl, one of the institutions in La Crosse's growing winter sports setup, comes in for attention next week, even though it is doubtful if Old Man Winter will have arrived to coat the countryside with the stuff for which the "Bowl" is famous.

Delegates will arrive in La Crosse for the National Ski convention next week-end from the east and the west, representatives already registered from Lake Placid, N. Y., and Sun Valley, Idaho. Dick Durance, combined slalom and downhill champion, who set a world's record at Sun Valley in the national tournament last year, will be among those in the present.

The convention starts Friday, Nov. 29 and continues through Saturday and Sunday. A local hotel will be the convention center. Friday night there will be a smoker, while the chief business will be undertaken Saturday. Concluding sessions will be held Sunday.

National Advantages

Because of the natural advantages, La Crosse years ago developed into playground paradise. Although La Crosse people had been skiing and tobogganing in the hills and coulee regions of the Mississippi valley for years, it was not until five years ago that plans were made to provide ample facilities for recreational skiing and to make La Crosse an attraction for all ski tourists. Ski enthusiasts from the Chicago district invaded the region, making week-end trips to enjoy the thrills of mountain skiing on the various slopes. Soon the snow trails from Chicago, Milwaukee, Minneapolis, St. Paul, Rochester and Des Moines were organized and La Crosse became a mecca for ski trade.

The invasion by the ski army demanded immediate action and the La Crosse Junior Association of Commerce was the first to respond to the demand. Progressive organization work was started and within one year the Snow Bowl was established and termed one of the finest skiing centers in the midwest.

The Bowl is nestled ideally in the State Road Coulee area and is located only two miles southeast of the city limits on highway 38, easily accessible by automobile. The natural bowl, open only at the

north end, is rimmed by virgin timber along the upper half. Because of the height and length of the slopes, a ski tow has been constructed.

When winds get nippy, skiers seek the warmth of the comfortable lodge, which has a large fire place, lounge and concession stand. Meals and refreshments can be obtained.

For skiers who enjoy treks through the woods, downhill trails have been built. These include the Rattlesnake trail, a sporty, fast track which is 1,000 feet in length and has a vertical drop of 450 feet and the Juniper trail which is the fastest in the middle west, being 2,200 feet long. A real test of one's ability comes on the Corkscrew trail of 2,400 feet. There is also a Fence Line trail of 1,000 feet for intermediate skiers.

Stone Praises Hill

Paul Stone of the Sun Valley Ski club said recently that "the Slalom hill at the Snow Bowl is one of the finest in the country. It compares in every way to mountain skiing except that it does not have the long runoff that is to be found in mountain skiing."

The hill is 1,000 feet long, 200 feet wide and had a vertical drop of 600 feet. The Bowl also has 1,500,000 square feet of open practical slopes with a vertical drop of 800 feet, completely devoid of rocks, bushes, and other hazards.

Much of the work on building the trails and improving the slalom hill has been done by the La Crosse Ski club, which is affiliated with the Central U. S. Ski association. Membership includes skiers from all over the middle west who make La Crosse their skiing headquarters.

The Snow Bowl was the first winter resort in the state to provide night skiing and one of the few in the midwest to have such facilities. A Ski Patrol of trained men is on hand at all times in case of injury to skiers.

The proof of the popularity of the Snow Bowl is shown by the fact that it has been the scene for the Central International team tryouts for downhill and slalom skiing, and the Central United States downhill-slalom combined championship last year, while other important events are booked for the future.

spot as Harmon, with the shuffles running the Buckeye stadium has ever witnessed, boosted his three year touchdown total to 33.

Harmon, unhampered by the slippery turf, also turned in some nifty blocking and when he left the game after his final touchdown—with only 38 seconds to play—the crowd gave him one of the greatest ovations ever tendered in Ohio stadium.

The Wolves were superb Saturday, while Ohio never had a chance.

Michigan marched 80, 81, 11, 101 and 52 yards for its touchdowns gaining almost at will through the line, around the ends or through the air. In addition, Harmon punted three times, to keep the Bucks deep in their own territory.
